Gavin's May Revise: After the Governor's initial budget proposal in January, his May Revise includes even more money spent and more money saved. In January Governor Newsome proposed a \$209 billion budget and it has since increased to \$213.5 billion. Democrats in California predict a \$21.5 billion surplus, so with that they plan to add \$16.5 billion in our rainy-day fund, spend \$81 billion in education spending, \$150 million in teacher pensions, \$650 million in homelessness spending, and lots and lots of new taxes. Now that the Governor's May Revise has been released, he and the Legislature have a month to negotiate the budget before it is due to be passed. Many of the taxes Governor Newsom has proposed will be challenged by the Democratmajority Legislature, but mostly because they have their own new tax proposals they want passed too. Some of the new taxes and tax increases Governor Newsom has proposed are a tax on businesses to fund the earned income tax credit for low-income families, a tax on water, a tax on fertilizer, and a tax on dairy to fund a drinking water initiative, a penalty tax on those who do not purchase health insurance, a phone tax to fund a overhaul of our 911 Emergency system, and a potential increase to our payroll taxes to fund paid-family leave. Democrats in the legislature have the votes to pass these bills without a single Republican vote in favor. But the challenge will come from Democrats in vulnerable if they vote for too many taxes, depending on their district. The recall of Senator Josh Newman still looms large over Capitol Democrats, when he was recalled in San Diego for his supporting vote of SB 1, the Gas Tax. There will be plenty to follow in the next month in Sacramento!

Speaking of Taxes: Speaking of taxes, the Legislative Democrats have introduced their fair share of new taxes and tax increases, rivaling Governor Newsom's proposals. If you added up all of the proposed new and increased taxes, it would top \$15 billion this legislative session. California Foundation of Commerce and Education President, Loren Kaye. So far Capitol Democrats have proposed an estate tax, a text tax, a water tax, a gun tax, an oil severance tax, a corporate income tax, soda taxes, a tire change fee increase, among others. The state of California is in it's tenth year of relative economic growth, yet we still have one of the highest poverty levels, some of the highest unemployment and under-employment levels, the highest housing costs, highest income taxes, highest gas taxes, the list goes on and on. So while the state may have one of the highest surpluses in our history, the lives of everyday Californians tell a different story. And when a recession hits, Californians and our businesses will struggle even more to keep up with these crippling tax increases.

Economic Good News Comes in Threes: The economic good news continues to roll in. With Republican tax cuts and regulatory reform, wages are up, the economy is growing, and on May 3, the Bureau of Labor Statistics announced the unemployment rate dropped to 3.6 percent in April, the lowest unemployment rate since December 1969. April also marks the 14th consecutive month of the unemployment rate being at or below 4 percent. Since President Trump was elected, more than 6 million new jobs have been created. Women are benefitting from the Trump economy. The unemployment rate for women fell to 3.4 percent in April, its lowest rate since 1953 (and 3.1 percent for adult women 20+). The unemployment rate for women has been below 4 percent in 12 out of the 13 months since March 2018, when it fell below 4 percent for the first time since the dot com boom in 2000. Read more here.

<u>Women Donating to the Trump Campaign</u>: Newsweek reported that nearly half of President's Trump's 2020 campaign contributions this year have come from female donors. The Trump campaign raised \$1.47 million in donations from women across the country in the first quarter of 2019, according to an analysis by the Center for Responsive Politics. The report is based only on donors who made itemized contributions of over \$200.




